NDOT HSO - Racial Profiling project:

MERC provides data acquisition, management, cleaning, and analytic services in addition to reporting on findings from traffic stop data across the State of Nebraska. Specifically, this project's objective was to gather available outcome data to examine for differences in traffic stops based on the known or perceived race of the person being stopped.

NECPA projects:

MERC's services on projects for this client are data collection, management, cleaning, and analytic services, as well as reporting on findings for more than 23 institutions/organizations on collegiate substance attitudes, perceptions, and behaviors. In addition, depending on the project, MERC develops either brief fact sheets on standard measures for each institution annually or comparison briefs highlighting significant findings for each institution per round of data collection.

NDHHS DBH projects:

In collaboration with *Partners for Insightful Evaluation*, MERC provides evaluation services on two sources of funding for the DBH, including the Substance Use Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery Services (SUPTRS) Block Grant [formerly known as the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant (SABG)] and the Strategic Prevention Framework – Partnerships for Success (SPF-PFS) substance prevention funding. 

Our projects are led and managed by one of our Project Managers, who then delegate work among junior staff and student assistants. MERC's staff have extensive experience and expertise in data synthesis and dissemination through report writing (including executive summaries, research, digests, and fact sheets/data briefs). Our expertise in evaluation, applied sciences, the social sciences, and data collection leads to a diverse team with ranging backgrounds and experience, including but not limited to analyzing/synthesizing data collected by others, developing measurement tools and resources based on data and best practices, making data-driven decisions, as well as collating a variety of data to tell a story and deliver resources.

MERC does not plan to subcontract any part of this contract.

Technical Response: Project Description and Scope of Work

Understanding of the Project Requirements

MERC understands that there are two major parts to this project. The first is to ensure distribution of summary materials from the Midwest Roadside Safety Facility to the general public; the second is to act as administrator for travel requests and provide financial reimbursements, as dictated by each participating state's documented reimbursement policies. To achieve the first part of the project, MERC will provide research summaries, news polls, and a program fact sheet. These deliverables will provide insight on findings to the general public related to the development, importance, and impact of crashworthy safety structures. To do this, project personnel will synthesize existing technical reports to provide translated research for public consumption. Specifically, MERC will provide the following tangible deliverables:

- Research Summaries: MERC will be provided with up to four (4) technical research reports from NDOT. Each of these reports will then be summarized using graphics, visual representations, and easy-to-understand language. These summaries will focus on communicating what research was conducted, how it was conducted, relevant results, and impacts on the transportation industry.
- 2. News Polls: Following guidance from NDOT, MERC will prepare up to ten (10) polls that will be given to consumers. Results from these polls will help to inform future articles, research, and other publishable items to be undertaken by NDOT.
- 3. Program Fact Sheet: MERC will provide one (1) program fact sheet summarizing all inprogress and completed State Planning and Research Projects, drafted in easy-tounderstand language that will be accessible by the general public.

To achieve the second major part of this project, MERC will provide administrative services for the Midwest Roadside Safety Facility Pooled Fund. Specifically, MERC will do the following:

Administrative Services: MERC will collect all necessary information for reimbursement
as defined by each state's contract and UNL requirements. MERC, in collaboration with
UNL's Research Finance Office (who oversees MERC's financial operations under the
umbrella of the Vice Chancellor for Research & Innovation), will coordinate and distribute
reimbursement payments directly to Midwest Roadside Safety Facility Pooled Fund
members.

Proposed Development Approach

MERC proposes a collaborative and iterative approach with open communication for the development of the required deliverables.

Research Summaries: After NDOT provides MERC with the report, MERC will synthesize the report and draft a summary, focusing on identifying the research problem and major findings. A draft report will be provided to NDOT for review, after which MERC will incorporate comments and edits into a final product.

News Polls: NDOT will provide MERC with a specific topic focus. MERC will conduct initial research and provide NDOT with a proposed poll and response options. MERC will then create the poll, track responses, and analyze data. A data summary will be provided to NDOT for each individual news poll.

Program Fact Sheet: MERC will summarize all on-going and competed research conducted by NDOT. This Fact Sheet will be continuously updated as new projects and research are undertaken

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL) takes exception to the clauses identified below. Where applicable, UNL has requested suitable replacement language.

Section II. Terms and Conditions

- 1. Section M. Indemnification. General. UNL, as an instrumentality of the state of Nebraska, is limited regarding indemnification. Agreement by the University to indemnify is a promise to pay funds that have not been appropriated in the current budget year or that may occur in a future budget year that has not yet been appropriated by the Nebraska Legislature. Agreement by the University to such an obligation violates article III, section 25 of the Nebraska Constitution, which states that "[n]o money shall be drawn from the treasury except in pursuance of a specific appropriation made by law" and the state debt limitation in article XIII, section 1 of the Nebraska Constitution. See State ex rel. Meyer v. Steen, 183 Neb. 297, 300, 160 N.W.2d 164, 167 (1968) ("Obligations which are to be paid from revenue subject to appropriation by future Legislatures are subject to the state debt limitation provision."). UNL proposes that "To the extent permitted by law," be added to the beginning of this paragraph.
- 2. Section M. Indemnification. Intellectual Property. Same request as above.
- 3. Section M. Indemnification. Personnel. Same request as above.

Section III. Vendor Duties

- 1. Section I. Insurance Requirements. UNL is self-insured, cannot waive subrogation, and cannot add the State as an additional insured. UNL would request all of Subsection 1. Workers' Compensation Insurance, Subsection 2. Commercial General Liability Insurance, and the Required Insurance Coverage table be stricken, and UNL proposes UNL's standard insurance language as a replacement:
 - a. "As of the date of the execution of this Agreement, UNL is self-insured pursuant to the University of Nebraska General Self-Insurance Program ("Program") and shall remain self-insured throughout the duration of this Agreement. Subject to the terms, conditions, exclusions, and limits of the Statement of Self-Insurance Coverage contained in the Program, the Program shall pay on behalf of UNL during the duration of this Agreement all sums for which UNL shall become legally obligated to pay as damages for liability occurrences, up to the limits of \$1,000,000 per liability occurrence and \$3,000,000 in the aggregate of liability occurrences in any fiscal year. UNL shall provide NDE with written evidence of such coverage upon request and will notify NDE promptly in the event of any modification of such coverage."
- Section K. Conflict of Interest. UNL would request modification as UNL (as an institute
 of higher education that employs several thousand individuals) cannot agree to not
 employ any individual with a conflict of interest. UNL maintains a rigorous COI
 program that regulates actual, potential, or perceived financial, monetary, or other
 conflicts of interest and conflicts of commitment. UNL would request the second
 paragraph be deleted in its entirety.
